Healthcare Options for People with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities Receiving Medicaid



If you have patients with intellectual and developmental disabilities and are Medicaid members, tell them to:

#### 1. Call their LME/MCO.

The LME/MCOs will be operating NC's Tailored Plan as of July 1, 2024, a health plan specifically for Medicaid members with an intellectual or developmental disability, serious mental illness, severe substance use disorder, or a traumatic brain injury.

# 3. Choose a Care Management Agency.

Please recommend patients explore this opportunity for assistance. There are organizations that focus on these populations. Individuals and families get to choose who provides this service.

Care Managers can also assist you as a physician by coordinating patients' services, educating about health issues, scheduling and managing appointments, following up on referrals, etc.

#### 2. Ask for Care Management.

Care Management, or Tailored Care Management, services are available for people who are Medicaid members and have an intellectual or developmental disability, serious mental illness, severe substance use disorder, or a traumatic brain injury.
